Alexander Werner

- member of the admin team at TDF
- been involved with TDF from the very beginning

Florian Effenberger

- been with OpenOffice.org for seven years, eventually as Marketing Lead and Distribution Lead
- member of the Steering Committee at TDF and member of the admin team
- responsible for marketing and infrastructure

Infrastructure – the unknown being?

- you'll never see infrastructure until it doesn't work
- technically enables the community to do all sorts of fun things
- it provides an important framework and platform for them
- has to be dynamic, scaleable, stable
- "infrastructure provides the playground where things happen"



We didn't start the fire...

- existing OpenOffice.org infrastructure at CollabNet with migration to Kenai planned
 - mainly tied to one IT service provider
 - many integrated services, a few external ones
 - "somehow works" and contains 10 years worth of data
 - one of the high-profile sites on the internet
- back then: pending Oracle decision about TDF also decides about future infrastructure



Status quo: three-way approach

- TDF-hosted services
 - mailing lists plus archives
 - websites and wiki
 - download management system (MirrorBrain) and rsync
 - translation services, DMS
- FreeDesktop.org-hosted services
 - development mailing lists
 - git repository, bug tracker (BugZilla)
- external services
 - worldwide mirrors
 - WordPress Blog



Numb3rs

- ▼ team of 14 administrators from 5 countries
- ▼ 7 TDF servers, plus FreeDesktop.org, plus external
- ightharpoonup TDF alone handling up to $m 10\ TB$ of monthly traffic w/o DLs
- **▼82** mirrors worldwide handled more than **6.000.000** DLs
- 110 mailing lists in 35 languages, over 600 MB in total
- 15,500 subscribers, half of them for announcements
- ▼ in total, over 200 GB of web-hosted data at TDF
- we handled **350.000** DLs the first week



I want to break free

- ▼ TDF not only managed to attract developers, maintain a product, create, shape and strenghten a brand, do marketing
- but also to take care of all technical needs by itself
- all based on free software
- all knowledge is within the community
- we are not tied to one specific service provider anymore
- we contribute back to other projects (mlmmj and PyMIME)
- in a nutshell:
 - Our infrastructure development reflects the freedom, openness and transparency that TDF stands for.



Some admin porn...

- Ubuntu 10.04 LTS as base system, moving to 11.10
- rented dedicated servers at a German datacenter
- well-known components used
 - Apache with mod_php or PHP-FastCGI, xcache
 - MySQL
 - ▼ Postfix, SpamAssassin, ClamAV, amavisd-new, Postgrey, PostFWD, policyd-weight
 - Dovecot
 - vsftpd
 - Mailman (for internal lists), mlmmj (for public lists)
 - rsnapshot for backup strategy



MirrorBrain - our mastermind

- ▼ introduced at the OpenOffice.org infrastructure as replacement for "Bouncer", heavily refined and enhanced now
- Apache module with rsync
- database of mirrors with their respective bandwith/priority
- selection of best download server based on GeoIP
- files are automatically searched, indexed and hashed
- GPG signatures are verified automatically and reported
- download statistics are generated
- three-tier mirroring system
 - push mirrors
 - staging mirrors
 - regular mirrors



Puppet on a string

- open source configuration management tool
- written in Ruby
- configuration is described using DSL (Domain Specific Language)
- every server can be configured differently
- configuration changes are automatically distributed amongst servers
- adding a new server is deadly easy

Puppet provides flexibility and expandability needed for the future.



Gimme gimme gimme...

- we contribute back to other projects
- mlmmj is our mailing list system
 - still rather unknown, but very flexible
 - moderators can work completely via e-mail
 - one file per message for easier backups
- we filed bug reports and lots of enhancements suggestions
- currently the help texts are localized in various languages
- ▼ TDF's own development: PyMIME under GPL license
 - converts charsets
 - adds footers
 - strips attachments and HTML messages
